As the fall semester gets underway, I invite you to visit Joyner Library in person or online and take advantage of the resources we provide. These include access to more than 400 databases, approximately 66,000 electronic journals, and thousands of streaming videos that can be used in the classroom or via Blackboard. Even though many of our resources are available and easily accessible online, there are still many reasons to come to the library. Joyner Library is open 24 hours, starting at 10:00 a.m. on Sundays through 9:00 p.m. on Fridays (Saturdays, we're open 10-9). In addition to our digital exhibits, we have art exhibits as well as numerous exhibits featuring materials from our special collections. We hope to see you this fall - for a library instruction session, a research consultation, to use the unique materials in Manuscripts & Rare Books, University Archives, and the North Carolina Collection, for a quiet place to work, or to check out books and other materials.

I'm excited about a number of Library projects underway this fall, including the following:

- We are helping faculty integrate library resources in Blackboard courses and incorporate research skills into the curriculum. Our Blackboard module on plagiarism is particularly popular, and we have a new module on called "thinking critically about information." - The ECU Libraries administer an [open access publishing support fund](#) that pays up to 3/4 of the fees required for publishing in a peer-reviewed open access journal.

- We're trying new ways to save students money on textbooks. When possible, we are licensing e-books for use in courses and providing streaming access to films required for courses. We also work with faculty to identify licensed content in our databases and e-journals that can be placed on e-reserve or streamed. A new initiative just getting underway will help faculty become more familiar with open textbooks. We are planning to start a program to provide stipends to faculty who want to change from a traditional text to a textbook option that is free to students. Similar programs have been shown to decrease time to degree completion (because students take more credit hours) and increase student success.

- Finally, there is a new online application called Research Compass administered by the Library that walks a researcher through the steps from idea to funded project. It's in beta now, and will soon be rolled out for campus-wide use.

Course Reserve: Print and Online

Looking to ensure your students have access to the materials they need for your class? If so, place books, DVDs, articles, and more on course reserve through Joyner Library or the Music Library. Many of the libraries' materials, as well as your personal copies may be placed on physical reserve for 3 hours, 1 day, or 1 week loan periods. Links to articles and streaming

media from the libraries' electronic resources can often be embedded by the library directly into your Blackboard pages. Scans of physical articles and book chapters can also be uploaded. The series, which is a collaboration between the College of Education's Office of Professional Development & Student Outreach, Education Community of Scholars, the Office of Assessment & Accreditation, and the TRC, is a diverse, dynamic schedule of workshops focused on assisting teachers with integrating technology into their classroom. A special kick-off event will be held September 10th in Speight 308 with face-to-face workshops offered every Tuesday in the TRC from September 15th through December 2nd. Sessions will be repeated online via Google Hangouts the Wednesday of the following week. Education & Instructional Technology Librarian, Dan Zuberbier, will teach workshops covering online

Special Collections Adds New Equipment

To better accommodate use of Special Collections material, a newly purchased KIC Bookeye 4 scanner now permits immediate scanning of delicate and oversized material. Featuring an 18"x24" scan bed, the Bookeye allows users to select paper or PDF output directly to their preferred e-mail account or USB storage device.

A lockable cellular charging station was also added, reducing competition for the limited wall outlets. Additionally, the patron computer terminals have been upgraded, adding solid state hard drives. 
VIVO

ECU Libraries launched VIVO, an open source software that allows users to discover researchers and research interests at ECU. Every ECU faculty member has a researcher profile that includes information such as articles, grants, books, courses, and other related activities. Additionally, ECU Libraries have included information about research labs on campus, including instruments and services. VIVO will be used to not only showcase faculty research, but also encourage faculty networking and collaboration. VIVO was developed by Cornell University and is used at a number of universities including Duke University, University of Florida, and University of Colorado Boulder. Government agencies and professional associations like the U.S. Department of Agriculture and the American Psychological Association have also adopted VIVO.

Streaming Video

Over the past year and a half, Joyner Library has been conducting a pilot project with two providers of streaming video. The project started out with only one class and a handful of films and quickly progressed to several classes and about sixty films. It was decided to move to a larger scale offering of streaming video services from these providers this Fall. The streaming videos have become very popular with students and faculty alike. Students appreciate the fact that they don't have to pay for the films and faculty like the ease with which they can be integrated into Blackboard.

Our providers are Swank and Kanopy. Swank specializes in theatrical release movies. Users can look at the films available from Swank at: <http://dc.swankmp.com/ecudatabase>.



ECU purchased 66 slots of which approximately half are being used for movies this Fall term; the rest will be used for movies next semester. Kanopy, on the other hand, specializes in documentaries and Criterion films. Users can see what's available from Kanopy at <http://eculib.kanopystreaming.com/>.

New Databases

During the summer, the library was able to acquire several new databases thanks to end-of-year monies from the division of Academic Affairs. These databases support research and teaching in a variety of subject areas, from Classics to Kinesiology, and from Archaeology to Computer Science.

We are excited to announce the Digital Loeb Classical Library, which provides online access to seminal Greek and Latin literature. Addition to the JSTOR collection is the latest, Arts & Sciences XIV, which brings



together 125 journals focused on the study of culture and communication. These journals date back to 1839, and represent 17 countries and 23 disciplines. We are also pleased to announce the purchase of volume II of Sports Medicine & Exercise Science in Video. This online resource is a large collection of streaming videos covering the topics of fitness and health assessment, disease management, injury treatment, nutrition, medical fitness, sport science, work-site wellness, exercise adherence, and more.

Joining these databases are the Oxford Handbook of Archaeology, archives of Springer's distinguished series Lecture Notes in Computer Science and Lecture Notes in Mathematics, and the Dictionary of American Regional English.

Joyner also began a new subscription to Data-Planet. Data-Planet provides easy access to a repository of more than 18.9 billion data points from more than 70 source organizations. Selected areas of coverage include agriculture, business, economics, law enforcement, energy, health, housing, labor, military and defense, natural resources, and transportation.
