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A Letter From the Dean, Larry Boyer

The Music Library, located in the Fletcher Building, has been provided with a delightful facelift and update, providing an enhanced research and study environment. Joyner Library's first floor has been transformed with the creation of our new Collaborative Learning Center that is attracting record

breaking numbers of readers. Users need to come early to claim one of the new comfortable chairs or booths. The Library is also exceedingly proud of our recent acquisition of the Stuart Wright Southern Literary Collection; this collection will attract scholars from all of academia and will provide extraordinary research possibilities for ECU faculty and students. Faculty are invited especially invited to our next FaculTea, featuring ECU Historian, Dr. John Tucker, talk about John Kennedy's visit to Greenville during the 1960 presidential campaign. Finally, I want to urge

you to participate in the 7th Annual Eastern North Carolina Literary Homecoming, this Friday and Saturday, September 17th and 18th. The Homecoming is a singular opportunity to meet successful North Carolina writers and poets and hear them talk about their work and the writing process. Stuart Wright Collection Acquired

Joyner Library recently acquired the literary collection of Stuart T. Wright, a noted bibliographer and collector whose work focuses on southern poets and novelists. A native of North Carolina and a graduate of Wake Forest University, Wright currently lives in England. He is perhaps best known for his published bibliographies of such noted American writers as A. R. Ammons, James Dickey, Richard Ghormley Eberhart, George Garrett, William Goyen, Randall Jarrell, Andrew Nelson Lytle, Walker Percy, and Reynolds Price. Wright developed close relationships with some of the writers represented in the collection.

Interlibrary Loan....Did You Know?

The services of Joyner Library's Interlibrary Loan and Document Delivery department have recently been extended to Friends of the Joyner Library, retired faculty, and retired staff. The document delivery service provides digital copies of documents housed in Joyner's circulating, reference, and microform collections – basically everything except Special Collections. The interlibrary service

extends access beyond Joyner's collections to include articles, books, and other materials held by libraries across the state and around the world. These services are being provided free of charge to Friends and retirees in recognition for their service to Joyner Library and ECU. Friends must have a current membership card and retirees must have a retiree One Card to prove eligibility.

Joyner Library Collection Guides

On April 12, 2010, a newly redesigned version of the Joyner Library Collection Guides website was unveiled.

The Joyner Library Collection Guides website contains descriptive information for over I.800 different collections that are managed by and located at Joyner Library. These unique collections are comprised of a variety of historical documents, including letters, diaries, business records, organizational records, church records, maps, genealogy notes, photographs, and over 300 oral history interviews. For the first time, this new website also allows researchers to search across collections that are housed within our University Archives and East Carolina Manuscript Collection

within the Special Collections Department.

Exciting new enhancements include:

- Tabbed views for each collection.
- Every finding aid now has at least two tabs. The first tab is the primary view of the finding aid, which contains all of the information about the collection as described by our library.
- The second tab, labeled "Add/ View Notes," is an interactive section where researchers can leave messages or information about a collection that will be

- on display for other researchers to see and comment upon.
- And finally, a third tab, "View Digitized Objects," will only be present on those finding aids that have at least one digitized item.
- Multiple ways to provide feedback

Stuart Wright Collection Acquired

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The Wright Collection consists of more than 3,000 printed works and 5,000 manuscripts. Included are portions of the private libraries of Eberhart, who taught for many years at Dartmouth College, the English poet Donald Davie, as well as first editions of southern writers Jarrell, John Clowe Ransom, Peter Hillsman Taylor and Robert Penn War-

ren. Many of the books contain significant inscriptions, annotations, and insertions that shed light on the writers' thought processes and their relationships with their peers. The collection also contains significant manuscript material, including notebooks, letters, and literary works by Madison Smartt Bell, Eberhart, Jarrell, Ransom, Taylor, and Warren.

Among the manuscripts are holograph letters written by Taylor

to his wife during World War II, notebooks and a virtually complete collection of poems written by Jarrell, and Warren's typescript of the screenplay (1949) for *All the King's Men*.

Other writers represented by books or manuscripts include Cleanth Brooks, Robert Lowell, Lytle, Merrill Moore, Katherine Anne Porter, William Styron, Allen Tate, and Eudora Welty.

Stuart Wright Collection Acquired

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Appraiser Lynn Roundtree of Chapel Hill, North Carolina, recently described the collection as "an extraordinary accumulation of rare first printings, association copies, authors' copies, dedication copies, authors' presentation copies, and literary papers of many of the finest American poets, novelists, and short story writers of the twentieth century." Of particular note is the inclusion of materials by five poets laureate, making the collection of great value to students and scholars who will be able to see the creative process on display through the manuscripts and published works of these poets.

Preliminary inventories of the collection have been completed, and all materials are available for research in the library's Special Collections Department. 7th Eastern North Carolina Literary Homecoming

East Carolina University celebrates the region's literary traditions September 17 and 18. The Eastern North Carolina Literary Homecoming at Joyner Library will offer interactive workshops in addition to panel presentations.

This year's theme "Contrasting Cultural Expressions: Perceptions of Place and Self" explores the impact of shared values and traditions on the perceptions of self and one's place in the larger world context. Artists from eastern North Carolina will interact with artists influenced by other regions to explore differences and how they capture the culture of their regions in their work.

For seven years, the Eastern North Carolina Literary Homecoming has been nourishing and revitalizing the creative spirit for writers as the event provides a place where artists and community members can interact and share ideas. The works represented by the award-winning authors encompass a variety of genres including poetry, fiction, historical nonfiction, and drama and how they tie into Eastern North Carolina culture.

This year, the Literary Homecoming will kick off with the presentation of the Roberts Award for Literary Inspiration to Nancy Olson for her work as the owner of Quail Ridge Books and Music in Raleigh and her dedication to promoting

and supporting local artists. The presentation to Olson will include tributes from and readings by North Carolina writers Jill McCorkle and Michael Malone.

On Saturday, panel discussions and small interactive workshops with authors encourage in-depth discussion regarding process and inspiration. Time will allow for audience members to interact directly with authors to explore issues raised in the sessions and audience members can meet the authors during book signings.

A luncheon with guest speaker Pamela Duncan, author of "Moon Women," "The Big Beautiful" and "Plant Life," will be held on Saturday. A native of Asheville, Duncan teaches creative writing at Western Carolina University.

Award-winning author Josephine Humphreys will deliver the keynote address at 5:15 p.m. Saturday. Her first three novels were mainly about contemporary family life in the South, but her fourth work, "Nowhere Else on Earth," is a historical novel based on a true story from



the Civil War. The novel includes historical events and characters relating to the Lumbee tribe of North Carolina and won the Southern Book Award for 2001.

Other presenters include ECU alumna Margaret O'Connor, director of photography for The New York Times when the paper won the 2002 Pulitzer Prizes for Breaking News Photography and Feature Photography, who will present "Recording the Moment When Cultures Clash' and poet Michael White, who teaches creative writing and poetry at the University of North Carolina-Wilmington, who will present a workshop on writing poetry.
